SP Record Sounds

When I was a kid and stayed in summer vacation at Okaya, Nagano prefecture where my grand parents lived in, I frequently listen to various 30cm (12") diameter phonograph records which RPM (Revolutions Per Minute) was 78 (SP; Single Play).

Steel needles

The vintage record player with thick pipe arm with a pickup installing a thick steel needle at leading edge to trace groove in a record had a crank driven spring coil inside working as revolution energy resource. To maintain constant 78 RPM, the spring coil had to be fully rolled up by rotating a crank arm even replay in progress.

The SP records that contained music below were manufactured between 1925 to 1940 before the world war II.

By listening to the recorded contents, you can be sensible of the atmosphere inspiring military forces spread in Japan in that era.
